HB 1017 (Ryu) Companion bill: SB 5046 (Wilson, J.)	Designating kimchi day. Establishes November 22 as kimchi day.	Jan 17 – Passed at executive session in the House Committee on State Government & Tribal Relations. Jan 20 – Referred to Rules to review.
<u>HB 1024 (</u> Kloba) Companion bill: <u>SB 5300</u> (Stanford)	Concerning the leasing authority of the state parks and recreation commission at St. Edward State Park.	Jan 27 — Executive action taken in the House Committee on Environment & Energy.
<u>HB 1065</u> (Walsh)	Concerning family burial grounds. Creates various rules and methods by which family burial grounds can be established, including how and when burial records will be sent to the county auditor.	Jan 29 — Scheduled for public hearing in the House Committee on Civil Rights & Judiciary at 8:00 AM.
<u>HB 1184</u> (Schmidt)	Creating a narrow exemption from overtime provisions for certain nonprofits and small businesses. Exempts nonprofits and small businesses with fewer than 50 employees from the minimum salary standards that are set for full implementation in 2028.	Jan 15 — Public hearing in the House Committee on Labor & Workplace Standards.

<u>HB 1205</u> (Ryu)	Prohibiting the knowing distribution of a forged digital likeness. A person is guilty of second-degree criminal impersonation if they knowingly distribute a fake digital likeness or audio recording of someone else as real, with the intent to defraud, harass, threaten, intimidate, or humiliate, or for any other illegal purpose.	Jan 13 — First reading, referred to Community Safety.
<u>HB 1364</u> (Orcutt)	Increasing the gross revenue threshold for unlicensed bingo, raffles, and amusement games conducted by charitable or nonprofit organizations. Increases the amount that nonprofits can raise through these activities without a license from \$5,000 to \$15,000.	Jan 17 — First reading, referred to State Government & Tribal Relations.
<u>HB 1393</u> (McEntire)	Providing public school students with opportunities for cultural expression at commencement ceremonies.	Jan 20 — First reading, referred to Education.
<u>HB 1576</u> (Walen) Companion bill:	Concerning the designation of historic landmarks by cities. A property cannot be designated as a historic landmark if: It is less than 40 years old; The designation would restrict the use, alteration, or demolition of the property without the written consent of the property owner.	Jan 24 — First reading, referred to Local Government.

<u>SB 5554</u> (Salomon)		
<u>HB 1613</u> (Reeves)	Concerning ticket sales. Requires ticket sellers and resellers to obtain a license, make certain disclosures to consumers, and limits delivery fees and dynamic pricing. Prohibits the resale of tickets obtained through bypassing security measures, with penalties for violations.	Jan 27 — First reading, referred to Consumer Protection & Business.
<u>HB 1631</u> (Nance)	Establishing the state marine forest. Establishes bull kelp as the state marine forest.	Jan 27 — First reading, referred to State Government & Tribal Relations.
<u>HB 1658</u> (Waters)	Ensuring dedicated funding for history and heritage museums and county historic preservation programs. Routes \$1 of the \$5 document recording fee to a designated fund to support operational and capital expenditures of history or heritage museums.	Jan 28 — First reading, referred to Local Government.
<u>SB 5000</u> (Wilson, J.)	Adopting the evergreen state as the state nickname.	Jan 17 – Passed executive session in the Senate Committee on State. Government, Tribal Affairs & Elections.

<u>SB 5065</u> (Liias)	Prohibiting the use of certain animals in traveling animal acts. Prohibits the use of elephants, bears, and large cats in traveling acts, while continuing to allow them at fixed locations.	Jan 17 — Passed to Rules Committee for second reading.
<u>SB 5098</u> (Valdez)	Restricting the possession of weapons on the premises of state or local public buildings, parks or playground facilities where children are likely to be present, and county fairs and county fair facilities.	Jan 16 – 1st substitute bill passed executive session in the Senate Committee on Law & Justice. Jan 17 – Referred to Ways & Means.
<u>SB 5106</u> (Trudeau)	Establishing Eid al-Fitr and Eid al-Adha as state holidays.	Jan 28 — Scheduled for public hearing in the Senate Committee on State Government, Tribal Affairs & Elections.
<u>SB 5134</u> (McCune)	Requiring public schools to commemorate the contributions of Chinese Americans and Americans of Chinese descent.	Jan 14 — Public hearing in the Senate Committee on Early Learning & K-12 Education.

<u>SB 5135</u> (McCune)	Concerning school districts' authority to establish their curriculum. Removes the requirement for school districts to follow laws & rules of the Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction when developing curricula. Repeals comprehensive sex education.	Jan 13 — First reading, referred to Early Learning & K-12 Education.
<u>SB 5390</u> (Stanford)	Updating the cost of the discover pass and day-use permits. Raises the discover pass cost from \$30 to \$45 and the day-use permit from \$10 to \$15.	Jan 30 — Scheduled for public hearing in the Senate Committee on Local Government at 1:30 PM.
<u>SB 5483</u> (McCune)	Preserving history and heritage education. Disallows school districts to censor or restrict instruction on national and state founding documents and speeches due to religious references.	Jan 24 — First reading, referred to Early Learning & K-12 Education.
<u>SB 5560</u> (Chapman)	Designating the Pacific razor clam as the state clam.	Jan 28 – First reading, referred to State Government, Tribal Affairs & Elections.
