# Welcome to Poetry Out Loud 2025

When the *Poetry Out Loud* program first started in 2005, 8 schools in a single Washington county participated. This year, 37 schools from across Washington State participated in Poetry Out Loud.

After classroom-level competitions and school-wide competitions, these schools sent their top students to participate in one of four regional finals held in Central, Eastern, Northwest, and Southwest.

In addition, eleven students from around the state registered for Poetry Out Loud Virtual, under the coordination of Tacoma Little Theatre. This program is available to individual students from non-participating schools, and home-schooled students. Six students from this cohort participated in their own final competition.

Top scoring students from each of these finals are competing today for the title of 2025 Washington State Poetry Out Loud Champion.

The winner of the State Final will receive \$200, and the winner's school will receive a \$500 stipend for the purchase of poetry books. The second-place finalist will receive \$100, with \$200 for their school library. The state champion will represent Washington State in the National Finals in Washington D.C. May 5 - 7, 2025.

The Poetry Out Loud National Finals will award a total of \$50,000 in scholarships and school stipends, with a \$20,000 college scholarship for the National Champion.

Poetry Out Loud invites the dynamic aspects of slam poetry, spoken word, and theater into the classroom.

The National Endowment for the Arts and the Poetry Foundation partner with State Arts Agencies

across the United States to support Poetry Out Loud, a program that encourages the nation's youth to learn about great poetry through memorization and performance. This program helps students to master public speaking skills, build self-confidence, and learn about their literary heritage.

Over 8,000 students from across Washington participated in the program this school year, reciting poems selected from an anthology of more than 1,100 classic and contemporary poems.

# **Poetry Out Loud Biographies**

## Asha Berkes, Emcee

Asha is a poet and educator in Tacoma. They have taught workshops all over Tacoma, in middle and high schools, with the Tacoma Public Library, at SOWA annual Bridge Conference, and more. Berkes serves as the Director of Educational Partnerships at Write 253 and teaches poetry at Tacoma School of the Arts. Berkes studied English, Gender and Queer Studies, and African American Studies at the University of Puget Sound. Their senior thesis, a collection of poems entitled "Lesbo Island" was a finalist in the Stories Award for Poetry at Not a Cult Media.

# Michelle Avitia, Judge

Originally from Los Angeles, Michelle moved to Washington to live and work in Olympia in 2018. She holds a B.A. from San Jose State University in English and Professional Technical Writing. Michelle spent many years writing and editing for independent literary magazines, held an editorial internship with Bitch Media, and a column with Catalyst Wedding Co magazine. In her free time, she enjoys hosting dinner parties, crushing her partner in sudoku, and volunteering at Community Print Olympia. Michelle currently works at ArtsWA as the Art in Public Places Program Coordinator and is a board member at Community Print Olympia.

# Elizabeth Hallberg, Judge

Elizabeth Hallberg was born and raised in Tacoma, leaving the area only to attend the not-too-distant Western Washington University to earn her undergrad degree in English, with additional interests in American Cultural and Women Studies. She then went on to receive her teaching certificate in English and Theatre Arts, finding a home base as an educator at Rogers High School in Puyallup, where she has taught for the last 20 years. She is passionate about infusing poetry into the classroom, allowing students space to explore their own voices in writing, and greatly appreciates Poetry Out Loud for being a program that supports those endeavors.

# Jeanette Sanchez-Izenman, Judge

Jeanette is a director, teaching artist, and theatre theorist/historian. She did her actor training at the University of New Mexico where she earned her BFA with honors and an MA in Directing and Educational Theatre.

(Continued) She moved to the Pacific Northwest for her PhD candidacy in Theatre History and Criticism at the University of Washington School of Drama. She is co-founder of eSe Teatro in Seattle and has worked as a dramaturg with Teatro Vision in San Jose (Perla) and with Teatro Nuevo Mèxico (Electricidad). She is a founder of Screaming Butterflies Productions with Kathryn Philbrook in Tacoma. Their indie company seeks to use performance to re-vision myth, community and justice.

# Jasmine Mahmoud, Judge

Jasmine Mahmoud is Assistant Professor in Theatre History and Performance Studies at the University of Washington. A performance historian, her work engages the Pacific Northwest arts sector, racial equity, and cultural policy. Jasmine has worked as a musician, theater artist, arts critic, and as a TeenTix Mentor and Teaching Artist. She serves as Board Vice President of On the Boards. She earned her PhD in Performance Studies from Northwestern University, MA in Arts Politics from NYU, and BA in Government from Harvard College. Jasmine currently serves as a Commissioner for the Washington State Arts Commission (ArtsWA).

# Aileen Keown Vaux, Judge

Aileen Keown Vaux is a poet and essayist whose chapbook Consolation Prize was published by Scablands Books. Their poems can be found in Faultline Journal, Roanoke Review, Northwest Review, and Portland Review and they publish interviews with poets and writers at The Rumpus. Katie Taylor (she/her) currently serves as the Director of Secondary Education at the Office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction. Her 25+ years in education has focused on secondary schools in Tacoma Public Schools and the Clover Park School District, and through her work at the Center for Strengthening the Teaching Profession. Her love of poetry began as an English major at the University of Puget Sound and fueled her work as a high school English teacher. Among her favorite movies is the documentary, "Louder Than a Bomb" and she thrilled to reengage with the power of the spoken word.
