HB 1613
(Reeves)

Concerning ticket sales. Requires ticket sellers and resellers to obtain a license, make certain disclosures to consumers, and limits delivery fees and dynamic pricing. Prohibits the resale of tickets obtained through bypassing security measures, with penalties for violations.

HB 1658
(Waters)

Ensuring dedicated funding for history and heritage museums and county historic preservation programs. Routes \$1 of the \$5 document recording fee to a designated fund to support operational and capital expenditures of history or heritage museums.

HB 1810
(Donaghy)

Concerning seismic hazard risk reduction. Requires Commerce to conduct a study on financial incentives to reduce the cost of seismic retrofitting unreinforced masonry buildings.

(Chase)

Requesting Congress to modify the Marine Mammal Protection Act. Requests that Congress modify the Marine Mammal Protection Act to allow greater flexibility for states and tribes to use adaptive management tools for pinniped predators of endangered salmon stocks across all marine shorelines and Puget Sound.
